9) Stream Updates

TEK - TEK Grad student is working two days a week as a summer RA and is collecting information on the effects of forest management on culturally sensitive plant collecting sites, including the affects of herbicides in such areas and will develop a annotated bibliography for Tl'azt'en Nation. Birch brochure will include other traditional uses for birch and birch bark baskets. A process needs to be defined on how Elders will be involved on important uses of plants, ecology, seasonal gathering and when plants are prepared for medicinal purposes [not sure what this means - should it be Elders will be involved in verifying? Identifying?]. TEK PhD student has prepared a summary of research topic ideas for review, suggests topic get defined by what outcomes or findings will be most useful to Tl'azt'en Nation in addressing their Treaty and Resource Management issues related to forest health. Place-names thesis is complete, and currently being reviewed by Committee, defense hoping to happen in October. Ten (10) place-names within the JPRF boundary of interest to Tl'azt'en Nation were documented; researcher will do a community presentation on findings.

Improved Partnership - IP Grad student was at UNBC in July to find accommodation and meet UNBC Supervisors, orientation included readings to complete before the fall semester. Student was recommended to sign up for Research Methodology and FN Studies courses. Meeting will be scheduled with IP Stream Leaders and JPRF to define environmental monitoring topic and methodology. Other IP Grad student is writing thesis on the methodology, analysis and outcomes on how Tl'azt'en Nation can measure JPRF success in implementing cultural components into their mandate, with defense hopefully in early 2007. IP got interest from a Innu doing his PhD to collaborate on IP findings with other co-management arrangements currently in place with FN in Canada. Another student is interested in looking at frameworks of Aboriginal forest management. The University of Quebec is seeking collaboration on the outcomes of IP research for a compilation study. Prince William Sound, AK, requested UNBC IP Stream Leader to review a proposal for co-management research funding. IP products include articles in the Forestry Chronicle, the LINK newsletter and a draft of methods paper on local level C&I.

Education - currently data analysis is being completed, but is taking a little longer than anticipated. Initially hoped to begin curriculum development in August, but with the delay in analysis and the schedules and other commitments of community members we wanted to involve in curriculum development, it was not possible to implement at this time. Education Stream will have to re-group to define achievable

goals within in the last 2.5 years of the CURA Project, and a process to implement TEK research into curriculum.

Ecotourism - first official day of employment for Tl'azt'en Ecotourism Stream Leader. Besides Ecotourism Stream Lead, will also assist as an IP RA, JPRF/Cinnabar RA and Tl'azt'en Nation with Economic Development proposal writing. Official title under JPRF is Recreation and Tourism Coordinator.
